## CSVA Annual Inspection Blitz June 2—4

The Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance's annual roadside inspection blitz is on the calendar for June 2-4.

CVSA's blitz is the largest targeted enforcement program worldwide that focuses on commercial motor vehicles. During this 3-day window, 17 trucks and buses will be inspected every minute across North America.

Every year, CVSA places a special emphasis on a particular category of violations. Last year's emphasis was on hazardous material, and this year, the area of main emphasis is <u>cargo securement</u>.

Why the Focus on Cargo Securement?

Cargo securement is a key element of safety, and should be included in every driver's pretrip inspection. For some types of loads, federal regulations require the driver to stop within the first several miles of a trip and recheck the tie downs and load securement equipment.

Flatbed and hazmat carriers need to pay extra attention to their

load securement, as this is the "hot-button" for inspectors this year. Take extra time to make sure your load is secured properly before you start out on your trip and (if feasible) check it regularly throughout your trip.

What Drivers Can Expect During the 2015 Roadside Inspection Blitz

The checks primarily will include North American Standard Level I inspections - the most thorough inspections of a truck driver and vehicle.

According to CVSA, drivers will be asked to provide their license, endorsements, medical card, and hours of service documentation. Drivers also will be checked for seat belt usage and for use of alcohol and controlled substances.

Here are some best practices to make sure your truck inspection goes as smoothly as possible: Pre-inspect the vehicle, including checking the load and mirrors. Minimize driving distractions, including phone use and a loud radio.

Keep the logbook current and neat. Inspectors will want to see the last seven days of activity. Inspectors will want to check out a CDL, medical cards, trailer registration, and documents in a permit book. Make sure all paperwork is accurate and current.

Remember bad tires could trigger a more thorough inspection. And if a Level I inspection is completed, get a sticker for it. Avoid lapses in attention and poor judgment by getting enough rest. Sleep deprivation is a threat to safe driving.

No attitude, please. A driver's best behavior during an inspection is always professional and courteous.

The most common violations are brakes out of adjustment, other brake problems, lights, tires and wheels, and cargo load securement. Other areas worth review include: coupling devices; fuel and exhaust systems; frame, van, and open-top trailers; steering; suspension; and rims and hubs.

## CLEAN INSPECTIONS = COLD HARD CASH....!

The Waggoners Trucking implemented a new program this year – the program is designed to reward drivers for taking the time to truly inspect their truck and trailer before pulling out of the gate. For their efforts Waggoners pays cash for clean inspections. The payout is determined by what level the inspection was performed at – meaning:

Level I (full inspection) = \$150.00 Level 2 (paperwork + walk around) = \$100.00 Level 3 (paperwork) = \$50.00

When stopped, for any level inspection, the first thing the officer will ask for is your license, registration, medical card and logs. With the introduction of e-Logs this year the convenience of presenting logs just got simpler.

To improve your chances of getting a clean inspection, during the daily DVIR (driver vehicle inspection report) if you find something that won't pass—before pulling out of the terminal bring the problem to the attention of our maintenance department. Shops are located in Billings, Columbus, Houston, Irving, Oklahoma City,

The vehicle inspection will include a check of the:

★ Braking System	★ Coupling Devices
★ Exhaust System	★ Emergency Exits (on buses)
★ Frame	★ Fuel System
★ Light	★ Safe Loading
★ Steering Mechanism	★ Suspension
★ Tires	★ Van and Open Top Trailer Bodies
★ Windshield Wipers	★ Wheels and rims

All inspection violations become part of the CSA / SMS record.

**Drivers** – get ready for a Roadside Inspection...

Basic securement equipment includes:

- ☑ Straps—clean, non-frayed and marked
- ☑ Chains—marked
- ☑ Binders—marked

Make sure your securement equipment is clean and properly stored, including all dunnage materials (4  $\times$  4's and fencepost).

A clean inspection is just a matter of keeping your equipment and paperwork in order and your log books current. With e-logs be sure to present to the DOT Inspector instructions how to download the logs.

# Remembering David Bultema...



David George Bultema, 67, Irving, Texas, died May 7, 2015, at Mercy Hospital in Valley City, ND. He had most recently been a resident at Sheyenne Care Center in Valley City, ND.

David was born on August 3, 1947, to George and Lorraine (Williams) Bultema of rural Wimbledon, ND. He was raised on the family farm in Dover Township north of Wimbledon. He received his elementary education at rural Dover Township School and graduated from Wimbledon High School in 1965. David was baptized at rural Dover Reformed Church and confirmed at St. John's Methodist Church of Wimbledon.

While growing up David worked on the family farm. He also participated in 4-H, Youth Church Group, little league baseball, Farmers Union Youth Group, and all high school sports. He enjoyed hunting and fishing, riding horses, and collecting baseball cards. He continued his interest in sports all his life especially following his favorite teams: Twins, Vikings, Wild, NDSU Football, OU (pictured left is David Bultema with Todd Militzer – Waggoners Trucking CFO - during a friendly rivalry between Oklahoma and Texas) and UND Hockey as well as NASCAR.

David attended North Dakota State University and worked at Farmers Union Oil of Wimbledon after graduating from high school. He then enlisted in the U. S. Army and was stationed in Germany for most of his service. After being discharged he attended Valley City State University.



David was a Farmers Union Insurance agent. David and Jane had two children, Preston and Taylor.

David began a career in the trucking industry first driving for Rudolph Bros. of Wimbledon and later becoming an independent trucker with his own semi. He would join Waggoners Trucking



of Billings, MT as an independent contractor. During his tenure he moved from the Owner Operator role to upper management team – working and living in several locations throughout the U.S. He was tasked with starting up trucking terminals for the company throughout the US – start ups from soup to nuts. His later duties took him to the Southern Region headquarters in Irving, Texas where he became the Safety Director, recruiter, Contract Manager for the Owner Operator Fleet including the sales and leasing of equipment. He was a dedicated, loyal and hard working employee of Waggoners for nearly 30 years. Wayne and David Waggoner looked on him as

their right-hand man and truly his going home has been a personal loss to them and the company.

David is survived by his son, Preston Bultema and his fiance, Jennifer Christiansen, of St. Cloud, MN, and his daughter, Taylor Sullivan and her husband, Brian, and their three daughters Hadley, Kendal, and Sidney of Hixson, Tennessee. He was extremely proud of all of them.
